swerving and traveling at 61 miles-per-hour in a 45 mile-per-hour zone. The driver failed to pull over despite the officer's emergency lights and siren. The vehicle eventually came to a stop, after the officer utilizing the vehicle's public address system, instructed the driver to pull over and stop. The driver had very slurred speech, glassy/bloodshot eyes and smelled strongly of intoxicants. The 33-year-old Royal Oak woman failed sobriety tests and was arrested for "Operating While Intoxicated." Breath test results were .10%.

E Fourteen Mile & Minnesota, 3/6/13, 2:47 pm: Troy Officers were dispatched to a two car injury accident at Fourteen Mile and Minnesota. One vehicle had traveled from the right through lane across the left through lane and into the turn-lane striking another vehicle head on. The driver whose vehicle was struck suffered minor injuries. The at-fault driver fled from the scene on foot but was apprehended by Madison Heights Police Officers on Fourteen Mile east of John R. Witnesses reported that as the at-fault driver ran from the scene he threw a bottle over a fence. A Troy Officer located the empty vodka pint bottle. Two additional empty vodka bottles were found on the floorboard of the at-fault driver’s vehicle. After failing sobriety tests, the 35-year-old Sterling Heights resident was arrested for “Operating While Intoxicated,” “Driving While License Suspended” and “Failure to Stop at the Scene of an Injury Accident.” Additionally, the 35-year-old is currently on parole and has two outstanding misdemeanor arrest warrants. Breath test results were .21%; more than twice the legal limit.

The Troy Police Department will continue to participate in the Operation Medicine Cabinet prescription drug take back program throughout the year. Citizens can bring unwanted prescription drugs to the Police lobby 7am to 10pm Monday through Friday and 8am to 4pm on Saturday for disposal. (No medical offices or commercial disposal allowed for Operation Medicine Cabinet) Only dry pills will be accepted, no liquids, sharps or packaging material.



Joint Fatal Accident Investigation Task Force Wins Chiefs of Police Award

Recently the Michigan Association of Chiefs of Police (M.A.C.P.) awarded the South Oakland County Crash Investigation Team (S.O.C.C.I.T.) it's "M.A.C.P. Award for Excellence in Traffic Safety." S.O.C.C.I.T. consists of traffic investigators from Troy, Auburn Hills and Bloomfield Township who jointly investigate serious and fatal traffic accidents in their respective jurisdictions.

S.O.C.C.I.T. was started in January of 2011 and the primary objectives in developing S.O.C.C.I.T. was to improve the ability of the communities to get a group of well-trained traffic crash investigators to the scene of a serious or fatal traffic accident as quickly as possible, conduct a thorough investigation, limit the length of time roadways were closed and to do so at the lowest possible costs. This is accomplished by maximizing the use of officers already on-duty in the three cities.

According to the report, Troy has the 2nd lowest crime rate ranking in Michigan for cities with populations of 75,000 to 99,999 (third overall regardless of population size limits). Troy was ranked as the safest city in Michigan 11 of the last 16 ranking periods. Troy has achieved “Safest City” rankings as high as 5th and 6th in the overall United States, in 2006 and 2005, respectively. In fact, in other than 2009, when it ranked 38th overall, Troy has consistently ranked among the top 25 safest cities in the United States with populations over 75,000 since 1998.

The crime categories used by CQ Press include all FBI Part 1 crimes, except larceny and arson. The FBI defines Part I crimes as the more serious crimes that occur in a community.
